



# The Best Cities for Women



Alexandria, VA

LHJ put America's biggest towns to the test. Which ones hit the heights for health care? Education? Employment? Produced by Margot Gilman



Virginia may well be a paradise for lovers, as the state slogan says, but it offers several other seductions for women who want to live well.


That's why two Virginia communities made this year's Top 10 list of America's Best Cities for Women. Coming in first was **Alexandria**, which offers a combination of scenic charms (a riverfront location and a picturesque pre-Revolutionary quarter bustling with boutiques and restaurants) with modern must-haves (well-paying jobs in government and business, quality schools and outstanding child care).

To the south, the booming community of **Chesapeake** landed in eighth place (and neighboring **Virginia**

**Beach** came close to the top, at number 12). Seven of our latest winners have made it onto our list before (including **Ann Arbor, MI**; **Burlington, VT**; and **Irvine, CA**), while the debutantes include **Chesapeake**, plus **Sioux Falls, SD**, and **Overland Park, KS**.

This marks the fourth year that *Ladies' Home Journal* has surveyed America's 200 largest towns and ranked them according to the qualities that are of particular concern to women. When we analyze a local economy, for instance, we consider the size of the wage gap and the percentage of women-owned businesses, as well as overall job growth. And when we look at lifestyle, we check out (continued on page 106)

(continued from page 102) not only the cultural resources and parks—but also the little details that can loom so large—such as the probability of finding a ladies' rest room when you really, really need one, or the likelihood that you'll have more good vs. bad hair days, based on prevailing weather conditions.

As always, we started our survey by asking readers to rank their most pressing concerns. When it comes to what makes a community a great place to live, you declared that a low-crime rate is paramount, followed by a pleasant lifestyle, good public schools, plentiful job opportunities, quality health and child-care resources and a significant number of women in local government. Then, with


the expert help of Sperling's Best Places ([www.bestplaces.net](http://www.bestplaces.net)), a leading demographics consulting firm in Portland, OR, we weighted the cities' scores to reflect those preferences.

But this year we significantly deepened our data pool. To get a sharper perspective on the availability and quality of health care for women from city to city—and to get a read on where women are more, or less, likely to practice healthy habits, like going to the gym or getting mammograms regularly—we consulted a number of sources. We turned to the National Institutes of Health for mortality rates for heart disease and five types of cancer; the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention (CDC) helped us track patterns of smoking, exercising and other behaviors (see "On Best Behavior," page 110). We even gathered information on how likely women in each town were to have annual Pap smears. To see where women's health care is at its best, see "The Best City For . . ." page 110.

Our very top winners were not only healthy, but also wealthy and wise. All

had better-than-average economies and job prospects—especially flourishing Plano, TX, and Sioux Falls, SD. As for family issues, most of our champs ranked in the top half nationally in education, child care, or both.



# The healthiest places to live

## On Best Behavior

You can drop those Flori-duh jokes now. Even if Floridians fumble their vote counts, the Sunshine State shines brilliantly when it comes to healthy habits. Four Florida cities rifle our index of healthy behaviors: Orlando, at number one, with Miami, Fort Lauderdale and Tampa in positions three, five and ten.

Using the latest data from the CDC and other authoritative sources, we created our ratings by calculating the prevalence of good and bad behavior (exercising, smoking) in each of the cities, along with the per capita presence of diet busters (fast-food chains) and boons (health clubs), as well as the average Body Mass Index (BMI) of local females.

The results were fascinating—and quirky. Orlando women, for instance, must flex some mighty willpower,

since burger joints (one for every 2,026 citizens) outnumber health clubs (one for every 4,098) by about two to one. As for exercise, while Californians predictably dominated our list, the best sweat set was the women of Lubbock, TX, who reported working out 1,029.4 minutes the previous month, or about 34.3 minutes per day (does line-dancing count?). No wonder the Lubbock ladies had one of the leanest BMIs—25.5.

At the other end of the scale, the five most slothful cities reported less than four hours of exercise per month, including Washington, D.C.; Springfield and Rockford, IL; Cleveland and Toledo, OH. And the pudgiest places, with BMIs over 36, were Columbus, OH; Topeka, KS; Brownsville, TX; and Kansas City, KS, which porked out at 37.



## Where Breast Cancer Kills

Newark, NJ, holds a regrettable health record: According to the National Cancer Institute, the city's rate of one breast-cancer death per every 2,895 women is the highest in our survey.

That shocking statistic may be explained by ethnicity: Newark's population is 56 percent African-American, and African-Americans, as a group, have a higher breast-cancer death rate than other racial groups. It may also have to do with socioeconomics: According to the most recent census, 26.3 percent of Newark residents are below the poverty line, and poorer people generally get inferior medical care and are more likely to die from cancer than wealthy people. Other factors that may contribute to a city's cancer mortality rate include proximity to superior medical facilities, as well as the population's diet and exercise habits.

## Speaking of Pap Smears

If you think you have a long wait to see your ob-gyn, consider the extra-patient patients of Cedar Rapids, IA, where there's only one such specialist for every 18,484 people!

The stirrups cup in this category goes to Washington, D.C., where the odds are lots better, with one ob-gyn for every 2,522 individuals.



## What Care Costs

Today's spiraling medical costs can give anyone a migraine, but some cities offer relative bargains on the average cost of visiting the doctor and buying over-the-counter drugs and staying in the hospital.

According to data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, New Orleans boasts the least

expensive medical bills among American cities—probably a lucky thing, given the local penchant for rich foods, late nights and frisky behavior.

Meanwhile, world-class medical centers like New York City or San Francisco and their surrounding areas may provide top-notch treatments—but at prices to match.

## Coverage Capitals

Even if the women of Overland Park, KS, don't make the best-dressed list this year, they're still America's best-covered females. An impressive 97.25 percent have health insurance, according to the CDC, compared to a national average of only 85.4 percent.

Nine of our Top 10 cities beat this national score; only Chesapeake, VA, fell short, with 79.76 percent. That's still far better than our bottom city, Brownsville, TX, where 42.4 percent of the women have no coverage. Since going without insurance often means going without mammograms, other important tests and prenatal care, these gaps are not only financial hardships, but health hazards as well.
