SUBJECT: ORDINANCE TO DEREGULATE COIN-OPERATED DRY CLEANERS AND LAUNDRIES BY REPEALING CHAPTER 4 (COIN-OPERATED DRY CLEANING ESTABLISHMENTS) AND CHAPTER 5 (COIN-OPERATED LAUNDRIES) OF TITLE 9 (LICENSING AND REGULATION) OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA, 1981, AS AMENDED.

ISSUE: City Council consideration of an ordinance deregulating coin-operated dry cleaning establishments and coin-operated laundries. Repeal of Chapter 4 (Coin-Operated Dry Cleaning Establishments) and Chapter 5 (Coin-Operated Laundries), Title 9 (Licensing and Regulation) of The Code of The City of Alexandria, Virginia, 1981, as amended, is needed to accomplish this.

RECOMMENDATION: That City Council approve repeal of Chapter 4 (Coin-Operated Dry Cleaning Establishments) and Chapter 5 (Coin-Operated Laundries), Title 9 (Licensing and Regulation) of The Code of The City of Alexandria, Virginia, 1981, as amended effective January 1, 2010, on first reading and set it for public hearing, second reading and passage on Saturday, October 7, 2009.

DISCUSSION: There is one coin-operated dry cleaner in Alexandria. There are six coin-operated laundries in Alexandria. Routine annual inspections by the Health Department have seldom uncovered problems with these facilities. The few problems noted have been minor.

In the past seven years there have only been four complaints about these facilities. Three of these complaints involved trash or rodents in the dumpster area outside one of the laundries. These complaints would normally be handled by Code Administration under other ordinances. The remaining complaint was that the restroom in a laundromat was locked. However, laundromats are not required to provide public restrooms.

Given that inspection of these facilities has little public health impact and that the Environmental Health Division now has fewer manpower resources as the result of recent

state budget cuts, deregulation of these facilities appears to be a reasonable course of action. Because the current permits for these facilities expire on January 1, 2010, that would be the logical effective date for repeal of the code chapters regarding coin-operated dry cleaners and laundries.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$7.00. The annual fee for renewal of these permits is \$1.00 per facility.

Title

AN ORDINANCE to repeal Chapter 4 (COIN-OPERATED DRY CLEANING ESTABLISHMENTS) and Chapter 5 (COIN-OPERATED LAUNDRIES), Title 9 (LICENSING AND REGULATION) of The Code of The City of Alexandria, Virginia, 1981, as amended.

Summary

The proposed ordinance will deregulate coin-operated dry cleaners and coin-operated laundries.

There is one coin-operated dry cleaner in Alexandria. There are six coin-operated laundries in Alexandria. Routine annual inspections by the Health Department have seldom uncovered problems with these facilities. The few problems noted have been minor.

In the past seven years, there have only been four complaints about these facilities. Three of these complaints involved trash or rodents in the dumpster area outside one of the laundries. These complaints would normally be handled by the Office of Building and Fire Code Administration under other ordinances. The remaining complaint was that the restroom in a laundromat was locked. However, laundromats are not required to provide public restrooms.

Given that inspection of these facilities has little public health impact and that the Environmental Health Division now has fewer manpower resources as the result of recent state budget cuts, deregulation of these facilities appears to be a reasonable course of action.
