SUBJECT: RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE FAMILY OF TRAYVON MARTIN, DENOUNCING RACIAL PROFILING AND REAFFIRMING ALEXANDRIA'S COMMITMENT TO ENSURING AND PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF ALL

ISSUE: Resolution proposed by the Alexandria Human Rights Commission supporting the family of Trayvon Martin, denouncing racial profiling and reaffirming the City's commitment to ensuring and protecting the rights of all.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: That City Council approve the attached resolution.

DISCUSSION: Members of the Alexandria Human Rights Commission, during the Commission's April meeting, affirmed support for local law enforcement, but expressed outrage at the City of Sanford's police department's response to the shooting of 17-year-old Trayvon Martin, which was to invoke Florida's controversial "Stand Your Ground" law. Commission members questioned the application of such a law in this context and discussed the need to address issues of racial profiling and vigilantism both locally and nationally. The Commission unanimously endorsed the submission of a resolution to the City Manager for consideration and presentation to City Council.

RESOLUTION NO.

Supporting the family of Trayvon Martin, denouncing racial profiling and reaffirming the City's commitment to ensuring and protecting the rights of all

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria has been on the forefront of promoting and encouraging respect for human rights for all, as evident in the passage of its Human Rights Ordinance, among the first in the nation, and in the creation of the Human Rights Commission in 1975, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission recognizes that acts of racial discrimination that occur anywhere are unsettling to all communities and that the elimination of injustice transcends geographical borders, and

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2012, 17-year-old Trayvon Martin of Miami Gardens, Florida, was tragically killed for apparently no other reason than being Black and wearing apparel that his assailant found objectionable, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission expressed outrage at the City of Sanford's police department's response to the shooting, which was to invoke Florida's controversial "Stand Your Ground" law, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission questions the "Stand Your Ground" law as applied in this context, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission affirms that, in the criminal justice system, police and prosecutors must properly balance the rights of victims with the rights of the accused, and

WHEREAS, in the wake of the Trayvon Martin killing, public outrage spread across the Nation, among all races, eliciting rallies of protest in various cities, including the City of Alexandria.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA

That the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia:

- 1. Supports the family of Trayvon Martin and their fight for justice;
- 2. Denounces racial profiling and vigilantism, and reaffirms its commitment to ensuring and protecting the rights of all, without distinction as to race, color, age, sex, religion, disability, ancestry, national origin, marital status, familial status or sexual orientation, regardless of characterization;

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- 3. Rejects in principle "Stand Your Ground" laws; and
- 4. Reaffirms that the pursuit of justice and equality must never be taken for granted and is a universal human right.

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission recognizes that acts discrimination that occur anywhere are unsettling to communities-at-large all around the world and that the elimination of injustice transcends geographical borders, and

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2012, 17-year-old Trayvon Martin of Miami Gardens, Florida, was tragically killed in a gated community while he was residing in Sanford, Florida, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission remains outraged at the preliminary response of the Sanford, Florida Police Department to George Zimmerman shooting Trayvon Martin, particularly applying Florida's "Stand Your Ground" law and as a result, allowing Mr. Zimmerman to go free rather than be arrested and remain in police custody on the night of Mr. Martin's death, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission joins others around the world in questioning the applicability of the "Stand Your Ground" law in the case of the State of Florida versus George Zimmerman, and

WHEREAS, the City of Alexandria's Human Rights Commission affirms that, in the criminal justice system, police and prosecutors, as officers of the court have an affirmative obligation to properly balance the rights of victims with the rights of the accused, and

WHEREAS, in the wake of the Trayvon Martin killing, public outrage spread across the Nation, among all races, eliciting rallies of protest in various cities, including the City of Alexandria.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA

That the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia:

- 1. Supports the fair and proper administration of justice as relates to the death of Trayvon Martin; and
- 2. Denounces profiling of and vigilantism against any and all federally protected classes under civil rights laws and reaffirms its commitment to ensuring and protecting the rights of all, without distinction as to race, color, age, sex, religion, disability,

ancestry, national origin, marital status, familial status or sexual orientation, regardless of characterization; and

- 3. Prays that the appropriate authorities in the State of Florida properly limit the application of its "Stand Your Ground" law, to the extent that they find that unreasonable provocation by one claiming self-defense pursuant to "Stand Your Ground" waives the same if s/he is the preliminary aggressor in what turns out to be a fatality; and
- 4. Reaffirms that the pursuit of justice and equality must never be taken for granted and is a universal human right as set forth in the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights.
